### Letter from the AAOP President

Dear AAOP Members,

On Tuesday, November 1, 2009, I had the honor of being moderator for our Academy's full-day seminar at the Greater New York Dental Meeting. This full-day program, entitled "Put Evidence-Based TMD Diagnosis and Treatment in Your Practice Tomorrow," was attended by approximately 50 practitioners, including general dentists, endodontists, oral surgeons, and physical therapists. Fellow Academy members Peter Baragona, Gary Heir, and Matt Lark provided a well-organized lecture format that I believe opened the eyes of those in attendance who were clearly looking for guidance and direction in a field that we all know remains misunderstood in the dental community. A few days following the program, I received three separate phone calls from colleagues who were in attendance. Each praised the clarity and quality of the presentations and remarked that there were more than a few pearls that they took back to their offices. Most telling, however, was the remark by one of my oral surgery colleagues who reiterated how fortunate he was to have practitioners like me to turn to, and how lucky patients in this country are to have an organization of dentists committed to understanding the complexity of temporomandibular and facial pain problems. Though flattered by his words, it became crystal clear that there remain too many general dentists and dental specialists who remain puzzled by patients in pain. Without past formal training and lacking a foundation of experience, the untrained practitioner continues to make misjudgments and mistakes, all at the expense of the patient.

Within a few short days of these phone calls, a 41-year-old female was referred to my office, visibly suffering with facial and toothache pain that had led to two molar root canals and subsequent extractions, all within a 2-week period. Her history was replete with similar past episodes, resulting in 12 root canal procedures over 7 years. What was most frustrating was that the history clearly showed that her insistence on treatment led one specialist to refer her to the next, each intervening with the techniques of their training. Ultimately, her cries of pain were met with blank stares and comments like, "I've never seen this before," "You can't have pain in that tooth since the nerve has been removed," or, the most troubling comment of all, "It must be in your mind." As we all have lived this experience, there is obviously much work to be done. Fortunately, I believe the Academy is up to this task.

With the realization that I only have 6 months remaining in this fast-moving presidential term, I encourage all of you to look to your communities to find opportunities for the AAOP Ambassadors to present a timely lecture on orofacial pain. Much of what was presented in New York could easily be formatted in a way so those of you with lecture experience could engage not only dentists, but physicians, dental hygiene groups, and nurse practitioners, as well. Find the venue, share it with Peter Baragona, and let's turn this great idea into a vital initiative. Though we as an Academy are making inroads with CODA and the formal recognition of the OFP training programs, the goal of specialty status is still likely a number of years in the future. Patients in this country can't wait that long. It is our responsibility to do our best with the manpower and opportunities given to us or created by us. I urge you all to get involved in this meaningful effort.

I look forward to seeing you all in Orlando from April 29–May 2, 2010. Register online now, book your airfare so you don't pay top dollar, and encourage your best referring doctors to join us for learning and recreation in Disney. It continues to be an honor to serve the Academy.

# Dr James Percy Lund, BDS, PhD

October 2, 1942–December 8, 2009

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of Dr James Lund, who died peacefully in his sleep on December 8, 2009. He was the beloved husband of Dr Jocelyne Feine, cherished father to Michelle and Katherine, devoted grandfather to Laura and Mihai, and adored brother of Paddy and Jo. He was also a dear friend and respected colleague to many around the world.

Jim was born in Lancashire, England, in 1942 and moved with his family to Southern Australia in 1957. He earned his Bachelor of Dental Science in 1966 from the University of Adelaide and, after a brief private dental practice in Mt Gambier, South Australia, came to the University of Western Ontario. It was there that he received a PhD in Physiology in 1971 and began his life of research. He went on to the Université de Montréal where he enjoyed a distinguished 24-year career culminating in an 8-year appointment as the Vice-Dean for Research in their Faculty of Dentistry.

In 1995, Jim was appointed Dean of the Faculty of Dentistry at McGill University, a position that he held until June of last year. It was a challenging time for the Faculty but under Jim's leadership, the DMD program at McGill was completely restructured. A champion of interdisciplinary research, Jim played a leading role in the establishment of several multidisciplinary centers at McGill, including the Centre for Bone and Periodontal Research, the Centre for Biorecognition and Biosensors, and the Alan Edwards Centre for Research on Pain. But probably his most satisfying accomplishment was the establishment of a flourishing Outreach Program that provides free dental care to vulnerable patients within community centers. In recognition of his work in establishing the Outreach Program, he was awarded a Medal by the Carrefour des Communités du Québec. In addition, the Outreach Program was awarded a Prix Qualité par L'Association des CLSC et CHSLD du Québec in 2003, and a Silver Medal of Excellence by the Canadian Council for the Advancement of Education in 2005. He is also a member of the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences.

Beyond his role as an excellent researcher and academic leader, Jim was an outstanding mentor to people at all levels of career development from undergraduate and postgraduate students to junior academic staff and peers in administrative positions. Through his nearly 40 years in academic life, he has helped bring the best out of an incredible number of people who sought his advice and used him as an example of energy, enthusiasm, and leadership.

The untimely passing of Jim will leave an enormous hole in the personal and professional lives of many of us.

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
