Other than when he has been on "vacation" with the US Coast Guard, he has been tireless in overseeing the day-to-day operations of our Academy. He has been my counselor and friend as we have dealt with numerous, major affairs including the passing of our president-elect, the separation from Talley Management Group, the construction of our new website, and the untold details of the day-to-day operations of the AAOP. He is a nonmember who is the ultimate example of true dedication to our cause. I cannot possibly thank him enough for all he has done these past 2 years.

I would like to emphasize that everyone should take some time to review our new website. It is now operational and continues to be under construction. One of our new additions will be the member forum, which, after logging on, allows members to develop a dialogue regarding topics of interest relating to patient care, research and literature review, business operations, employment opportunities, etc. With time, this will become an excellent way for the AAOP community to develop friendships and working relationships and expand our ability to communicate with each other.

There are a number of affairs that are in preparation for the 2012 annual business meeting that AAOP members should know. For example, we will be having a signing ceremony during the meeting for our new ICOT agreement. Representatives from all five sister academies will be present for this event to conclude negotiations that have taken place over the past several years. You may recall that we intended to have this signing event last year in Las Vegas, but it had to be postponed due to some technical glitches. This agreement will be in place for the next 20 years, and our 2014 meeting, again in Las Vegas, will be the first international meeting for ICOT.

The AAOP is also considering a Sleep Medicine Committee to be added to our Bylaws by a membership vote. This proposal has been developed by Dennis Bailey and will be presented to the membership well in advance of the meeting. With the science of sleep and pain becoming more integrated, the AAOP Council is supporting the addition of this committee to our organization's affairs.

The Council has voted to support an increase of our Academy dues in an effort to maintain our economic viability. For your information, the Academy has two basic income sources: our dues and our annual meeting. Members of the Council attend the annual meeting and a mid-year meeting and participate in conference calls, all without financial compensation. Committee chairs and members all work hard as volunteers. We have reduced our costs for our executive services substantially by ending our relationship with Talley Management Group. And yet, with all this cost-cutting and volunteer effort, we continue to struggle to balance our books. Unfortunately, in this economic environment we are unable to find external sources of support, such as grants or endowments. You will be receiving notice of this dues increase for membership vote in the near future.

Looking forward, there are many issues that the Academy will be facing in the future. The AAOP is only as strong as its membership, and the Council looks to each of you for your active support. It has been my impression that over the past few years, in part motivated by Don Primack, our intra-academy communications have expanded tremendously. And with our new online forum about to surface, we as an organization will have increasing opportunities to interact on a variety of levels. It is my hope that this expanded communication capability will bring the affairs of the Academy into "real time" so that future AAOP presidents will be able to have more efficient and timely interaction with the members. And this tool will, in turn, create a stronger Academy and bring greater enthusiasm and motivation to our members.

This letter represents my final communication to the membership after serving you for the past 2 years. It is most certainly time for me to step aside and have Ed Wright take over as your new president. However, having served on the Council and the Executive Committee, as any past president will tell you, leaves a deep impression in your mind and place in your heart for the AAOP. #### Our Next President: Edward F. Wright, DDS, MS, MAGD

Ed Wright became an ABOP diplomate in 1995 and an AAOP member in 1998. He was a member of many AAOP and ABOP committees, and the editor for the AAOP Newsletter from 2002 to 2008. Ed has been a member of AAOP's Council since 2004.

In 1994, Ed completed the University of Minnesota's 2-year TMJ and Craniofacial Pain Program and also received his MS degree. From 1994 to 2001, he was the head Air Force dentist for TMD and provided the TMD training for Lackland Air Force Base's AEGD, Prosthodontics, Periodontics, and Orthodontics residents. In 2003, Ed completed a 2-year Dental Research Fellowship with the Veterans Health Care System (VA), where he studied headache patients treated with TMD appliance therapy.

Ed is the author of the book *Manual of Temporomandibular Disorders*, which is in its second edition. He is the UTHSCSA Dental School's Course Director for their TMD Course, their Dental Anatomy and Occlusion Course, and their Occlusion and TMD Course. Ed is the primary author of over 30 journal articles and is a question-writer for ABOP's written examination. He is greatly honored to have been selected to become our next AAOP president.

## AAOP Outreach Committee Activity

The AAOP Outreach Committee is a young ad-hoc committee formed last year in Las Vegas by AAOP's Council. Its function is to seek out like-minded organizations around the world that share common interests with AAOP and to establish communication. The purpose of these many communication lines is multifaceted and quite dynamic as each of the relationships is developed. All in all, the committee has sent letters of introduction to national and international pain organizations and requested that these lines of communication be established. To date the most fruitful contacts have been with organizations such as IASP through their Special Interest Group (SIG) on Orofacial Pain, and with the Pain Care Forum (PCF).

The PCF is an organization whose primary purpose is to provide a forum for the exchange of information and ideas to further the general education and knowledge of members regarding public policy issues surrounding the treatment of pain, and to provide a forum to coordinate and focus commitments to action regarding public policy issues that affect the treatment of pain. Its member organizations include most if not all of the major pain organizations in the USA and include many of the pharmaceutical companies who are producers of medications and therapies for the management of pain. The organization meets monthly in Washington DC but has a call-in option to participate in meetings. Members of the Outreach Committee have participated in the last two PCF meetings via telephone.

The Outreach Committee is recommending to Council that AAOP join the PCF for the purpose of placing AAOP in a national organization of recognized and renowned pain organizations of the United States and establishing open recognition of the AAOP as an organization whose members are dedicated to the treatment of pain. This recognition should help to enable AAOP to continue to maintain its primary position as a leading orofacial pain organization in the USA.

We Look forward to the Council Proposal on AAOP Joining PCF.

As most of you know, the American Board of Orofacial Pain annually administers a written and oral examination testing competency in orofacial pain. Those who successfully pass this two-part examination are given the designation of Diplomate of the American Board of Orofacial Pain with all the rights and privileges that come with that honor. AAOP members also earn the designation of Fellow of the American Academy of Orofacial Pain. Recently, the American Dental Association, through the Commission on Dental Accreditation, has designated OFP as an advanced area of dental education and has developed educational standards for advanced general dentistry education programs in orofacial pain. Working with CODA, the AAOP has authored a Core Curriculum in OFP that has been accepted as the basis for advanced OFP programs throughout the United States. Now, the ABOP must revise the examination to be in sync with the CODA standards. We need your help. The questionnaire will be distributed at the AAOP Conference in Pasadena. This is an absolutely mandatory step in standardizing the examination. We need you to complete and send it (once only). You can complete the survey using the link in the electronic version of the newsletter that was emailed to you.
